CLAIRE M. RENSHAW PAST PRESIDENT/ PAST TREASURER REBEKAH ASSEMBLY & PAST PRESIDENT LADIES AUXILIARY PATRIARCHS MILITANT

Sister Claire M. (Dreibelbis), 79, formerly of Hamburg, PA, passed away in the Middletown Home, where she was a residing approximately 10 years. She was initiated a Rebekah into Clementine Rebekah Lodge #571, Hamburg, on the fourteenth day of April, 1962. She became a PNG and received her Rebekah Assembly Degree on April 13, 1972. She held many positions over the years in the Rebekah Assembly, serving as Rebekah Flag Bearer from 1972-73, District Deputy President from 1977 – 79, Treasurer from 1982 – 1986 and then excelled through the Assembly Chairs to serve as our President from 1988 – 1989. She then served as Representative to the IARA from 1989 – 90. She then became a Member of Lady Colfax Rebekah Lodge #182, Leesport, through consolidation on October 7, 1996. She was

also an associate member of Susannah Rebekah Lodge #247, Harrisburg, joining October 5, 1968 and retaining membership until they went defunct May 28, 2011. She served many years as Representative to Unified Session and served in the past as Parliamentarian. She was a Lady of the former Reading Auxiliary #2, later known as Leesport Auxiliary #2, serving in many capacities there, Banner Guard from 1970 – 71, Guard from 1972 – 73, Officer of the Day from 1973 – 74, L Aide to Chaplain 1974 – 75 and Aide to PP from 1997 – 98. She served as President of the Ladies Auxiliary Patriarchs Militant from 1992–93. She later was transferred into Jurisdictional LAPM, when Leesport Auxiliary #2 went defunct. She was a recipient of the Decoration of Chivalry on June 23, 1981 and the Meritorious Service Jewel in 1993.

She was also very active in the Rebekah Home of Harrisburg, serving several years on the Board of Directors, two years from the Rebekah Assembly. During the 1972 flood, she volunteered herself to help with the safe evacuation of the Guests. At the time of consolidation with the Odd Fellows Home of Middletown, she was serving as Vice President of the Board. In 1978, she served as Rebekah Assembly Representative to the Odd Fellows Home of Middletown. She was also instrumental in organizing the Home Auxiliary and served as its President from 1979 – 1984, and served many years after.

Coming from a large Odd Fellow family, she was preceded in death by her parents, Howard and Eleanor Dreibelbis, sister Ruth Latkis and Brother Alan Dreibelbis. Surviving is her husband, Harold, of Triune Lodge #307, one son and two grandchildren.

Rebekah services were conducted by the Past Presidents and Members of Lady Colfax Rebekah Lodge #182 and the Rebekah Assembly, with a PM and LAPM Honor Guard and burial was in the Middletown Home Cemetery.

A nurse by trade, she did much to establish hospital corps within the various branches and did much fundraising to provide medical equipment at Unified Sessions and at the IOOF Headquarters in Pennsylvania. Her project as President of the Rebekah Assembly was to provide a wheelchair to be used at Unified Session, which has been very beneficial. Claire was very active in our Order and stressed Unity within our Branches and involvement in the Community.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows (IOOF) lodges Vienna #847, Allentown; Victory #658, Sellersville; Bushkill Encampment #55; and, Canton #39, Allentown, held their golf tournament to benefit Camp JRA, to sponsor up to thirty (30) kids afflicted with juvenile arthritis to attend the camp for one week during the summer.

This year's goal was short of the \$10,000.00 we had hoped to raise to send more kids to Camp JRA; however, we are still very grateful and appreciative of our golfers and sponsors that still allowed us to raise \$6,017.00 for Camp JRA and the kids. Thank you.

About 70 golfers came out at the end of Tropical Storm Cindy passing through South Mountain at 6:30 a.m. to get their generously stuffed 'welcome bag' and a continental breakfast – inside the garage for the golf carts. The golfers did not hesitate to increase their donations on the 50/50, raffle, and the Mulligans while passing the time for the rain to pass us.

At about 7:15 a.m., Cindy was quickly passing us to the east to give the public golf course pro and Rory King, our host, the instructions for the day about playing on the two (2) open courses. By 7:45 a.m., later than scheduled, the golfers began their day.

A local foursome was in an auto accident; but, still managed to attend to play the tournament.

And, we, the 15 organizers and volunteers, continued to break-down the tables to set-up down the street at the pavilion reserved for us, fortunately with the rain clouds dispersing to let the warm and humid sun shine on us for the rest of the day.

While the golfers were out on the courses, we organizers and volunteers worked on the pavilion to prepare for the golfers' return, which included trophies, donated swag and a big hot lunch prepared by a local caterer.

During that time, we learn that Lauren, from the Eastern PA Arthritis Foundation, was stuck in traffic on the PA turnpike due an accident, and would not make the golf open in time to accept the ceremonial check.

By 12:45 p.m. most of the golfers were at the pavilion, relaxing before their well-deserved hot lunch at about 1 p.m.

The golfers began receiving their trophies about 1:30, being very appreciative for receiving them and more so for their part of the tournament.

Charlie Danihel, Chairman, PA IOOF Jurisdictional Arthritis Committee, accepted the ceremonial check in the amount of \$6,017.00 on behalf of Lauren, and the IOOF Eastern PA Arthritis Foundation, located in Philadelphia.

Charlie could not thank the lodge members, organizers and sponsors of the golf tournament enough for the donation and work that everyone did to make the day an enormous success, even though it rained for most of the event.

The real winners of the day are the kids that will attend Camp JRA this year.

A very special 'Thank you' to: The lodges, regional and state offices that donated to this year's tournament. Wedgewood Golf Course for allowing us to hold the event a second year at their golf club; Thank you for the extra helpers we had that made the day a success: Linda Torrence, (Bruce's' wife) and daughter for getting up very, very early to sell the auction tickets, and assist with other tasks; and, Bruce and Trudy, the caterers, that prepared another excellent lunch for everyone; and, Rory King, the man that made it all happen.

TREASURER'S TALES - AUGUST 2017

August 1922 was a busy month for farming in New Jersey. Barney and Elizabeth were settling in the farm house with Barney's parents. Elizabeth had made great friends with Warden and Conductor and they looked forward to her evening trips to the barnyard with scraps.

Barney would not start school till after Labor Day and he didn't plan the subject matter till closer opening of school. He tried reviewing grammar first, with the introduction of a Shakespeare play. Since Elizabeth was a married woman, she did not need to look for a job. Married women did not teach school in 1922. Her emphasis was placed on farm living.

Alexander Graham Bell died in August 1922, leaving the world with a legacy of telecommunications. Sandy Kenyon was born, the future star of the short-run television series, Crunch and Des. You can watch an episode here: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=_21ttClhZxY If you like salt water fishing, you may find the show amusing. The most amusing event of August 1922 came on the 25th when the Philadelphia Phillies and the Chicago Cubs had the highest scoring game in baseball history with 49 runs, the Cubs won 26-23. The worst event of August 1922 was when the Queensboro Corporation paid \$50 for 10 minutes of airtime on the New York radio station WEAF and used it to advocate suburban living and promote apartments in Jackson Heights. In effect, it was the first infomercial. You probably thought infomercials were new.

The days of Barney and Elizabeth were filled with harvesting and canning corn, beans, squash, tomatoes, peppers, cabbage and a variety of other crops. There would be pork and beef to can as well, when butchering started in October. The chickens, ducks and geese were not butchered until close time for their consumption. In August, everything from the garden was fresh and had a better taste, compare to the restaurants and grocery stores you go to today.

Elizabeth was out picking tomatoes and she heard a cry. Venturing further out in the garden, she came across a kitten. It looked like its mother had abandoned it and it was hungry. She picked it up, put some fresh, warm milk in a bottle and started to feed it. As luck would have it, her father stopped by with papers he wanted Barney to circulate for the Odd Fellows Labor Day picnic. He took a long look at Elizabeth feeding that cat and said, "I think you will regret picking up that kitten."

Elizabeth replied, "He is so cute and we have a dozen or more cats in the barn, I am sure he will makes friends after I get him up to regular weight. He can stay in a basket on the closed-in porch till then."

Vic smiled, "Did you notice how short his tail is?"

Elizabeth responded, "His mother probably wasn't well fed during the pregnancy, and he was in poor health from birth."

Vic explained, "I know you haven't seen the likes of him before, but he is a bobcat. There used to be a lot of them in New Jersey, but the farmers and other residents put a bounty on them and nearly exterminated them. The scientific name for the animal is Lynx rufus, and the clearing of forests destroyed the habitat while trapping and hunting have contributed to their elimination. You do not want to keep that cat. Once we get him feed for a couple days, I have a friend who is the vet at the Bronx Zoo, we will take him there and he will have a better home."

Elizabeth was disappointed, "Couldn't I keep him here?"

Vic quickly replied, "I don't think Barney will want a cat that kills his turkeys, chickens and small pigs and may decide to eat Warden and Conductor as well."

Elizabeth shared the story with Barney and two weeks later on Friday, they went to the Bronx Zoo and delivered the cutest kitten they had seen. Vic accompanied them. As it turned out, the vet at the zoo was an Odd Fellow and he posted the picnic notices for Vic, even offering to sell tickets. The tickets to the picnic, covering a full dinner of baked ham and all the trimmings was a whopping \$0.40, but there were also fireworks and a talent show. The money went to a good cause, the Odd Fellows.
