I am confident that the reports will be completed and sent to the Grand Lodge by the due date. Please keep the new instructions in a file so that as we make changes to the Manual, you will have them for future reference. In the near future, we will have a three-ring binder for each Secretary and District Deputy Grand Master in which to keep the updates as they are completed. THE TREASURER'S TALE • APRIL 2025

April is spring. The days are warming, crops are planted, animals that hibernate are awakening and life begins anew. For those of you who are poetry buffs, T. S. Elliot wrote a poem entitled The Waste Land. This poem contains a line that proclaims "April is the cruelest month." This poem was a lament to spring rebirth that follows the death of winter. The poem was written in 1921 and was inspired by the events that followed World War I. Barney's class will read the poem.

The biggest day in April is Easter Sunday, which occurred on April 20, the same date as Easter 2025. Easter traditions have changed over the years, but 1930 was a time when religious observance was more important than today.

On April 1, 1930, Chicago Cubs catcher Leo Hartnett broke the altitude record for a catch by catching a baseball dropped from the Goodyear blimp 800 feet over Los Angeles, California. On April 3, the second academy awards took place with Mary Pickford winning best actress and Warner Baxter winning best actor. On April 6, the Twinkie was invented and packed lunches have never been the same. On April 21, the movie version of "All Quiet on the Western Front" premiered. On April 27, Chicago White Sox first basemen Bud Clancy never handled the ball in a 9-inning game against the St. Louis Browns.

On April 3, Helmet Kohl, German Chancellor under a united Germany was born. April 9, John Bartholomew Tucker, American TV host (Candid Camera, 1974-75; Treasure Island, 1967-68), and author, was born in Pennsylvania. On April 12, Johnny Antonelli, baseball pitcher for the Giants was born. On April 15, Vigdis Finnbogadottir, was the fourth president of Iceland and the first woman democratically elected, was born. On April 19, Dick Sargent, American actor (Bewitched), was born in Carmel, California. On April 28, Carolyn Jones, Morticia on the Addams Family, was born.

April was a very busy month for Barney. He had to plan the final two months of school, do most of his planting (some was done in March) and supervise the farm. The most daunting task was planting potatoes. As many of you know, a seed potato or piece of one, containing an "eye" or sprout is buried in the ground. The problem arises when planting is observed by a hungry raccoon. The night after planting, some of the seed potatoes are unearthed and eaten. This causes some irritation to Barney. The real problem is that Barney has become sympathetic to the culprit and is unwilling to trap or shoot him. Melchizedek prospers.

Chickens were getting cheaper, but had not bottomed out. Barney did an analysis of eggs and chickens and decided to rebuild his flock in early 1930. He had over 120 laying hens and 40-50 roosters. He was averaging 100 eggs every day. Retail price on eggs in 1930 averaged \$0.44 per dozen, this is equal to \$8.22 today. He was only getting about \$0.15 per dozen from stores. It was decided Barney would supply the eggs for the Easter egg hunt. The hunt was scheduled for Saturday, April 19, 1930, at the IOOF hall.

Barney collected eggs for about a week prior to the hunt. He had accumulated 650 eggs of high quality. On Good Friday, after church at noon, Elizabeth, her mother Alice and sisters Mary and Alberta, spent the remainder of the day boiling and coloring eggs. Commercial egg dye was available, but costly. Natural colors were used, onion skins for redbrown, Alder catkins for yellow, coffee and walnut shells for brown and madder root for red. Early Saturday morning, Vic and Barney went to the lot behind the IOOF hall and hid eggs. They knew that hiding them the night before would lead to many missing eggs. Melchizedek loved to celebrate Easter with an egg hunt. All the children of the Odd Fellows had a great time and by 1:00 pm, most of the eggs had been found. Barney noticed movement behind the outhouse and went to investigate. Elizabeth's youngest brother and sister, John and Virginia were peeling eggs and feeding them to Melchizedek. Barney now knew how the wily raccoon had learned about hard boiled eggs. There was no use in scolding them, so Barney went to his car and took out the eggs that broke during the boiling process and feed them to Melchizedek as well.

When Barney asked his class to read The Waste Land, he thought he could get some stimulating conversation. He asked why April was cruel and the answer from most of the students was that they had to be in school when the weather was getting nice. 100TH ANNIVERSARY – ARE YOU A BUILDER?

Again, we face the same problems today that we have 100 years ago. From the September 1925 magazine: This is a longer article, but having received reports from Lodges, there's always such a large amount of people being suspended. Compared to deaths, here's the total from the last 3 years' reports:

2022 - died 71, Suspended 40

2023 - died 45, Suspended 52

2024 - died 61, Suspended 59

This is something each Lodge needs to work on. Here's a good article to send to each member of your Lodge. Though they receive the magazine, impress upon them how important it is to pay your dues, and if they decide to leave, at least do it in a respectful way.

THE SUSPENSION PROBLEM

One of the questions which confronts us semi-annually, and which for several years has been given consideration by or leading men, is the suspension of members. This can be placed under three separate headings or causes, the Order continues to steadily decrease membership. First, the weeding out of undesirable members, who should never have been allowed to affiliate themselves with us. Second, members who do not want to longer retain their membership; and, third, those who have allowed themselves to drive to a position where they are liable to suspension for non-payment of dues.

The remedy of the first condition is in the hands of the officers of the lodge, who ought to insist that men be put on investigating committees who will do their full duty and report the conditions as found to the proper officers. This class is small, but when they are accepted as members and found undesirable, the lodge should be guided by the laws provided for the removal of undesirables.

The second condition is easily met. The lodge should present the matter to these brothers from a business standpoint and insist upon them paying all arrearages and taking a withdrawal card, or by resigning from membership. This is the only honorable position to take.

The third class presents more of a difficult proposition, but can be handled by a competent committee, if the first two candidates are properly cared for. This class embraces persons who are desirable as members, who fully appreciate what Odd Fellowship teaches and who are persons of such character that the lodge was willing to accept them into membership. The financial demands of the lodge should be impressed upon all new members and they should be made to feel that it is a part of their duty as members to accept a part of the financial responsibility of the lodge. That they should make proper payment of such obligations when they are due, just as they would pay their landlord, grocer or taxes. The dues assessed against the individual members of a lodge are the result of much study and foresight, taking into consideration all those obligations which must be considered, as weekly sick and funeral benefits to members, taxes on property, taxes and assessments levied by higher branches of the Order and the current running expenses of the lodge. All of these constitute the legitimate expenses which the lodge is legally bound to pay, and the brothers who assume membership are morally bound to contribute their proportionate share of the expense. We believe it to be one of our paramount duties to go on record that no member may ever be induced to believe that the usual, legal or decent way to get out of the Order is through being suspended for non-payment of dues, and thereby violating a solemn pledge. We believe that if this question was brought fairly to the minds of the members our suspensions would become almost nil. Instruction of members in the pro rata expenses of the lodge might cause some of the brothers to open their eyes and feel the responsibility personally of keeping their dues paid to date. This could be done by any brother who would care to take the annual report and analyze it upon the basis of membership. At any rate, we would like to see such a plan tried out in a thorough manner and find whether or not it would stop the leak which was been depleting our membership yearly - suspension for nonpayment of dues.








FROM THE DESK OF DOROTHEA OERTEL PGP

ODD FELLOWS & REBEKAHS ASSOC. OF W. PA 2025 SCHOLARSHIP AWARDS

FROM THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER...

HONORING MAJOR GENERAL OLIVER O. KING, PDC

All deceased Past Department Commanders of Pennsylvania are buried in our State except for one - Major General Oliver O. King, our eighth Department Commander, who rests at the place of his retirement, Albuquerque, New Mexico. Because I am, over my two year term in office, visiting the graves of all deceased Pennsylvania Past Department Commanders, I have been committed to make this journey. I am sure that all Pennsylvania Brothers and Sisters of our Order would agree, February is a good month to choose for a flight to the "Land of Enchantment". And so I did for what would turn out to be a



very memorable Graveside Service with descendants of Major General King and New Mexico Odd Fellows attending.

Oliver Othello King was born on September 25, 1908 in Pittsburgh to Leroy and Mabel King. He was one of seven children - four brothers and two sisters. Raised in the Methodist faith he later moved to Coraopolis. Mr. King followed in the footsteps of his father and owned his own plumbing business. In 1930 he married Elizabeth Ann (Fielding) King in West Virginia and with her raised two children, Frances and Oliver Ir.

In March of 1944 Oliver King entered the United States Army and bravely served our nation with distinction during World War II. The March 5, 1945 edition of The Pittsburgh Press newspaper lists him as being injured on the battlefield in Germany. Due to these injuries he was awarded the Purple Heart. In the Patriarchs Militant, we are permitted to wear our Armed Forces awards and decorations on our uniform. Pictures of Mr. King wearing our uniform show that he continued to wear his Combat Infantry Badge as well as other awards earned during World War II service. In October 1945, after over a year in Germany, he was discharged from the Army with the grateful thanks of our nation - one of the men of "The Greatest Generation" who helped save our country and the free world.

Mr. King first joined the I.O.O.F. in 1941 by becoming a Brother of Dexter Lodge #723 where he eventually became Lodge Secretary (Dexter Lodge merged with Coraopolis Lodge #429 which merged with Clover Lodge #348). He was Exalted to the Royal Purple Degree as a member of F.M. Rea Encampment #148 of Pittsburgh (merged with Ambridge Encampment #259) where he became Past Chief Patriarch by 1946. He received the Grand Encampment Degree in 1948.

Patriarch King was then conferred the Chevalier Degree and thus became a member of Pennsylvania Patriarchs Militant Canton Pittsburgh #18. He steadily rose through our ranks until, in 1958, after serving as Commander of the Fourth Regiment, Department of Pennsylvania, Colonel Oliver O. King received our highest award, the Grand Decoration of Chivalry. The award is based on service to Country, Community and the I.O.O.F. and entitles him to forever use the prefix "Sir" within our Order. As we know, this award is rarely given - only two Chevaliers currently wear the Grand Decoration of Chivalry in Pennsylvania. Finally, in 1962, then Brigadier General King was elected by the Chevaliers of the Department of Pennsylvania to be their eighth Department Commander for a two year term (1962-64). Officially titled Department Commander Major General Sir Oliver Othello King, he was awarded his two star rank because of the 16 or more Cantons under his Departmental Command. In researching Major General King's term as Department Commander I was at a loss to explain why he cut short his term as Department Commander by six months. Our archives give no reason and by all accounts he was an effective and popular leader. Consultation with one of his grandchildren provided the answer to this mystery. In mid-1964 Major General King's children moved to Arizona and in the interest of family unity he and Mrs. King followed. Thus he served an abbreviated one and one-half year term as Department Commander. This appears to have been a difficult decision for him, but one which was based on something that I am sure we all agree with - family first.

We also want to remember and honor Mrs. Elizabeth King, for she too was an Odd Fellow and dedicated many years to the good works of the Rebekahs. She was a long time member of Nellie Rebekah Lodge #31 of Coraopolis. I have seen numerous pictures of Mrs. King accompanying Major General King while attending to his official duties in the Patriarchs Militant. They were an important couple in Pennsylvania Odd Fellowship in their day.

In 1971 Major General and Mrs. King relocated from Arizona to Albuquerque, New Mexico, again to be with family. After being a resident of that place for three years, Major General King died in September of 1974. Sadly he was only 66 years old - his fraternal family and his own family lost a good man way too soon. He was survived by his wife Elizabeth, children Frances and Oliver Jr., three brothers and two sisters. In Pennsylvania, Arizona and New Mexico he was a respected and well liked man who had many good friends. Major General Oliver King was joined in Eternal Rest a short four years later by his beloved wife Elizabeth. And thus they rest together today, as we honor and remember them in their Odd Fellow Family. At their graveside we prayed that Major General and Mrs. King would know that the great Fraternal Order that they so selflessly committed much of their lives to will always cherish their memory.

I was joined at the beautiful and sacred grounds of Fairview Memorial Park in Albuquerque by the King's Grandchildren - Karen with husband Paul, Katie, and William with wife Debi. This was an emotionally touching gathering with the King's three grandchildren in that they hold such fond and loving recollections of their Grandparents but have not had the opportunity to come together in this way to remember them. Some wept when memories were shared during our service. Grand Daughters Karen and Katie held pictures of their Grandparents - Mr. King in his Patriarchs Militant Uniform and Mrs. King in her beautiful Rebekah gown. Grandson William brought a family heirloom treasure to the memorial - Major General King's white handled Patriarchs Militant Officer's sword. It has been and always will be kept in the family as a fond remembrance of his Grandfather and the



important role that the Patriarchs Militant played in Major General King's life. I enjoyed being with this family as we honored the Kings.

We were privileged to have Past Grand Master of New Mexico Ernie Cloud join with us and participate in the King Memorial Service. He spoke on the significance of the teachings of Odd Fellowship, informed us of the state of the local Lodges and invited those present to join our Order. Brother Cloud also presented a solemn reading of a prayer taken from our Pennsylvania Patriarchs Militant Memorial Service. His presence was greatly appreciated on this day.

Such was the spirit of goodwill at this service that as we concluded I found myself compelled to spontaneously say that the eternal watchwords of our sacred Order - Friendship, Love and Truth; Faith, Hope and Charity; and Universal Justice - were with us on that day, guiding us in our relations to one another just as they did when Major General and Mrs. King walked this earth.

Uniform Facts

In the Patriarchs Militant we commonly wear our Class A (Full Dress), Class B (Field) or Class C (Social) Uniform. Because these uniforms have a variety of optional component choices (e.g., hats, belts, decorations) we see Chevaliers with many slight uniform variations. Still, they are virtually identical uniforms within each class. There are however a handful of obscure and unusual uniforms authorized for wear in the Patriarchs Militant Army. The following five such uniforms are some that you will trarely if ever see worn.

- 1. Tropical Variant Uniform: This was introduced just a few years ago to give a more comfortable option for those living in certain hotter climates. The rules regarding its use are unusual and even confusing. According to our manual this uniform is intended to replace our Class A (Full Dress) Uniform under specific circumstances. Even though it is a replacement for Full Dress, the manual calls it the "Field Uniform -Tropical Dress Variant". Field Uniform is how we refer to our Class B uniform, thus the confusion. The best way to describe the Tropical Variant is the Class A (Full Dress) uniform without the coat. The shirt is switched to short sleeves worn with all three of our sleeve patches and no Jewels or shoulder cord. All other components remain as with Class A (Sam Browne belt, cap, tie, etc.). I have never seen this uniform worn correctly. Many confuse it with a class B uniform and in fact think that the Class B is the Tropical Uniform. It is actually a replacement for the Full Dress Class A Uniform and a Department wearing it would still wear their Class B when appropriate. A Department must apply annually to the General Commanding for a Dispensation to wear this uniform. The average temperature of the coldest month of the year in that particular Department must exceed 59 degrees, so it is limited to only a few states. In the short time that this uniform has been available I am not aware of it having ever been properly administered and worn. The average high temperature for our coldest month in Pennsylvania is less than 31 degrees so for this reason we will never see this uniform worn by a Chevalier of our Department.
- 2. Bandsman Uniform: Hidden deep in the General Military Council Bylaws is a provision allowing for the wear of a uniform from the past. APPENDIX III, SEC. 2 of the General Military Council Bylaws lists "Bandsman" as an authorized uniform. Our uniform manual does not provide any guidance on the specifications of this uniform. There was a time however when the Bandsman Uniform was commonly worn by Chevaliers. For many years military style marching bands were a big part of the Patriarchs Militant where they provided partiotic and martial music for our huge parades, assemblies and reviews. Of course part of the show was their own unique style of uniform that set them apart from the squads of Chevaliers that they were marching with. I do not believe that the Patriarchs Militant have had a band anywhere for many years, but the uniform remains authorized for wear. Since no new description of a Bandsman Uniform exists in our current Uniform Manual by default it remains as was worn by Patriarchs Militant Bandsmen of the past. I have seen these old uniforms in the far recesses of some of our Lodge storage closest grey with upright collars, concealed buttons and large metal PA insignia. It is nice to think that they will be put back to use but the Bandsman Uniform is one that we will probably never see worn again.
- 3. Kilt Uniform: Actually listed in the Uniform Manual as an optional garment as part of the Class C Mess Dress Uniform, the Kilt is therefore not really a uniform unto itself but a version of Class C Mess Dress. This leads to some interesting gaps in the uniform manual as regulations regarding the distinctive hose and flashes, sporran (satchel), and belt among other accessories that commonly go with a kilt are not specified. More importantly, we have no regulation Tartan, meaning that right now the Chevalier may choose whatever Tartan he or she wishes. There has been discussion on the need for a standardized Patriarchs Militant Kilt Tartan or design, preferably utilizing the signature black and gold colors of our branch of the Order. However for practical purposes the Kilt Uniform as a version of the Class C Mess Dress is almost never seen I know of only two Chevaliers who wear it, and they do so rarely.
- 4. White Uniform: This uniform was removed from the manual after August 2022 but grandfathered so that those who owned it at that time may still wear it. Best described as the all white Navy style Officer uniform often seen in movies, it has an upright collar and requires white cap, belt and shoes. To own one would be expensive and even if you did it would be rarely worn and information on it was so scarce in the prior Uniform Manual that it simply says "if wearing consult Adjutant". I have never seen it worn and have anecdotally heard that someone might have had one many years ago. Because only Chevaliers that owned this uniform before 2022 may wear it and because it has not been seen in recent memory I think it safe to say that although still authorized we will never see it worn again.
- 5. Military Advisor USA Uniform: This, to me, is the most interesting of our list of obscure authorized Patriarchs Militant uniforms. The General Commanding appoints the Military Advisor USA with a rank of Major General each year. The appointed Officer must by code be a military veteran. According to the General Military Council Bylaws this Officer has the unique authorization to wear his/her Armed Forces Uniform that they last wore when separated from service. The uniform may be worn for the Military Advisor's one year term in office. Wearing the service uniform is optional and I have never seen it done. Interestingly, due to the six branches of the Armed Forces each with their own uniforms and with each branch themselves having a variety of uniforms it is unlikely that we would ever see two veterans serving as Military Advisor USA wear the same outfit, so it is truly a one of a kind uniform option. The question is how many of us could still fit in our old service uniform?
