## CHARLEROI LODGE #1030 LIFE CHANGING SERVICE DOGS FOR VETERANS

Charleroi Lodge #1030 held a May 1, 2025 "social" meeting to promote Odd Fellowship and provide a community service by inviting the public to hear about the organization "Life Changing Service Dogs For Veterans.'

This organization provides service dogs to veterans suffering from post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), traumatic brain injury (TBI), emotional or

mobility issues, and other injuries.

Tom Anderson, treasurer of LCSDFV, spoke about the founding of the organization, which came about because a couple of veterans were frustrated to hear about fellow veterans taking their own lives. He then briefly explained why he became involved......"I feel like I have a great obligation to those people to do anything I can do to help them," Anderson said. "I am not a veteran, but at any moment in time, less than one percent of the population is defending our country. The country that we live in and the things that we have, those men and women have ensured that they are ours."

It costs between \$20,000 and \$50,000 to train a service dog and integrate it into the home. It takes up to two years to train a dog, and training begins as a puppy. Each dog has a different training and different ways of alerting humans about potential problems. There were zero suicides when the dogs were given to their owner, and the divorce rate among recipients of a service dog is around 5%, which is less than the veteran divorce rate of 85%. Approximately twenty-two veterans die each day by suicide and the organization has raised more than \$2 million for the gifting of the service dogs to more than 70 veterans per year.

Craig Hodgkins, MSGT USMC, of Upper Saint Clair, told his story as a veteran to lodge members and guests present. Trained at Guardian Angels Medical Service Dogs, his service dog Foxy, a long-haired German Shephard, hasn't left his side since May of 2020. As a U.S. Marine Corps veteran, Hodgkins has faced numerous challenges after his service, including PTSD, vertigo, suicidal thoughts, and more. "Foxy mitigates the challenges of PTSD: This includes shielding, grounding from anxiety/panic attacks and flashbacks, and waking me from nightmares. With my mobility issues, Foxy assists me with my balance and alerts to Vertigo." Hodgkins now has a full-time job, plays in a band, and is fully engaged in society, thanks to Foxy, who has gotten him out of burning buildings, saved his life many times, and is his companion.

"Because of her, I get to spend time with my grandchildren," Hodgkins said. "There is no way I would be able to tell you what I was going through if it wasn't for this dog. With Foxy by my side, I've found the strength and confidence to navigate daily life once again. She provides practical assistance when I need it, but it's her unwavering emotional support that has truly transformed my life."

Foxy was honored as the Service Dog of the Year by Guardian Angels Medical Service Dogs in 2022. The donation from the Charleroi Lodge #1030 will go toward helping veterns, like Hodgkins, to be able to function by providing them service dogs that can save their life.

Charleroi Lodge #1030 is already making plans for a presentation this fall by the Rescue 22 Foundation, a veteran-operated nonprofit that also provides free service dogs to veterans.

### YORK SPRINGS LODGE PARTICIPATES IN MEMORIAL SERVICE




## MALVERN LODGE TAKES TO THE STREETS


He was a U.S. Navy Veteran and a member of St. Peter's U.C.C. in Tatamy.

### **TREASURER'S TALES - JULY 2025**

Session at Middletown will be over by the time you read this. If you were there, I probably ran into you. Hopefully you enjoyed your session and are planning on going to Sovereign Grand Lodge in Charleston, West Virginia in August. It was a bit closer in Pittsburgh last year, but it will be farther away in the future.

This is the month we celebrate our country's birth. July 4, 1776 was a long time ago, but we commemorate it to this day. I hope all of your celebrations are safe.

Many things happened in July 1930. On July 2, Chicago White Sox outfielder Carl Reynolds becomes only the 2nd player in Major League Baseball history to hit home runs in 3 consecutive innings in 15-4 victory at Yankee Stadium. On July 7, construction began on the Boulder Dam (later Hoover Dam). On July 19, Richard E. Byrd, Laurence McKinley Gould, and their polar expedition team return to the United States following the first exploration of the interior of Antarctica. For global warming fans, on July 21, the thermometer hit 110 F in Millsboro, Delaware, setting the state record. On July 23, Pittsburgh Pirates 3<sup>rd</sup> baseman Pie Traynor ends both games of a double header with HRs (1st in 9th, 2nd in 13th). On July 25, not to be outdone by their cross-state rivals, the Philadelphia Athletics triple steal in 1st and 4th innings versus Cleveland. On July 29, the thermometer hit 115°F in Holly Springs, Mississippi (state record). This was a hot month all around. On July 31, NY Yankees first baseman Lou Gehrig drives in 8 runs with a grand slam and 2 doubles in a 14-13 win over the rival Boston Red Sox.

There were births too. On July 3, Pete Fountain, American jazz clarinetist (Lawrence Welk), was born in New Orleans, Louisiana (d. 2016). American Businessman and baseball team owner, (New York Yankees), George Steinbrenner, was born in Rocky River, Ohio. On July 14, Polly Bergen [Nellie Burgin], American actress, singer, television host, and writer (Winds of War; The Helen Morgan Story), was born in Knoxville, Tennessee (died 2014). On July 20, Sally Ann Howes, British-American stage and screen actress and singer (Brigadoon; Chitty Chitty Bang Bang - "Truly Scrumptious"), was born in London, England. On July 22, Sonny Liston, American boxer (world heavyweight champion 1962-64), was born in Johnson Township, Arkansas.

Just as the famous are born, so must they die. On July 7, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, chronicler of Sherlock Holmes died.

The biggest July event in Grover's Mill was the Fourth of July picnic. I have written several times about this picnic in years gone by. I am going to ignore the picnic to cover another important event.

Barney spent his summers farming. Farming is a hard job that can be made harder by unfortunate circumstances. Barney was being invade by groundhogs. These pesky critters will go after corn and other crops, dig holes in the fields obstructing tractor use and generally irritate farmers. Barney was accustomed to such animals but 1930 seemed to bring out a large herd from southern Jersey. The so-called straw that broke the camel's (farmer's) back occurred when Barney hit a groundhog hole and broke the axle of his tractor. This called for a declaration of war.

Barney had several guns, including a 1903 Springfield, like the one he carried in France in 1918. This was too big, so Barney bought a .22 rifle and a couple boxes of shells. Every time he sat on his back porch, the groundhogs seemed to leave. He went over a week and hadn't taken a single shot. Barney remembered the snipers in France had spotters to help them locate targets. Barney needed a spotter. As luck would have it, raccoons like corn even better than groundhogs. Training a raccoon to be a spotter was an arduous task. If your father-in-law is a veterinarian and an expert on animal

behavior, it helps.

So on July 6, the Tuesday after the holiday weekend, Barney and Vic enticed Melchizedek onto the back porch of Vic's animal hospital. Summer apples proved the downfall of the wily raccoon. It took a week just to teach him to point. After a while, he was climbing a small peach tree near the corn field and watching for groundhogs. Raccoons naturally hate groundhogs because they compete for food and groundhogs have a nasty disposition. On day too of his patrol, Melchizedek spotted a groundhog and signaled to Barney, who proved as good a shot as he had been in France over a decade earlier. Within a few weeks the groundhog problem was solved. But it cost Barney most of his summer apples.

Last year we wrote a about a fair. It was then agreed that the fair should be an annual project of the lodge. It was. The fair took place before the attack on the groundhogs. Barney had his right ankle bandaged for the fair because he fell off the tractor when the axle broke. He sprained his left ankle. I mention this now because we know that the garbage cans at the concession stands were always being pilfered by raccoons. Melchizedek now helped Barney sit on his porch and shoot groundhogs. He also knew Barney would shoot him and he couldn't chase him either. All garbage cans in Grovers Mill became fair game for several weeks.

### FROM THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER...

HONORING COLONEL STEWART L. BRENNEMAN, PDC

My May cemetery visit to honor a Past Department Commander was planned for the 21st and I was therefore committed to that date, rain or shine. I woke on that day to heavy rain and drove from my home in Bucks County to the beautiful and sacred grounds of Mount Rose Cemetery in York through constant rain on the turnpike, this to honor and remember our twentieth Department Commander, Colonel Stewart L. Brenneman. He was an Odd Fellow that was very special to our history in the



Jurisdiction of Pennsylvania, leading the Pennsylvania Patriarchs Militant as Department Commander from 2010 to 2011. I was prepared with foul weather gear and assumed that our customary graveside ceremony would be cut short. But as if we were being watched over from above the rain came to a complete stop - just in time - and resumed falling just after we concluded our solemn ceremony. We were able to perform our full ceremony and I believe that this was more than just luck.

Stewart LeRoy Brenneman was born in York on November 19, 1933, the son of Lloyd E. and Catharine W. (Sonnerman) Brenneman. Mr. Brenneman was a 1952 graduate of William Penn High School, where he met his future wife, Catherine "Sis". They married just after her graduation in 1953. At that time, he worked for Redco Tool in Red Lion.

Stewart Brenneman enlisted in the U.S. Army a short time later. His basic training was at Camp Breckenridge, KY with the 516th Airborne Division, U.S. Army Security Agency (this was the signals intelligence branch of the Army at the time). He also trained with the 26th Field Artillery Battalion, 9th Infantry Division, Fort Dix, NJ. Mr. Brenneman served much of his time in the Army overseas, serving our country during the Korean Conflict, from 1953 to 1956.


After discharge from the Army Mr. Brenneman settled in Dover and went to work for the U.S. Postal Service. He worked for thirty-seven years as a mail handler in Dover Township and served as President of Local 31, National Association of Post Office Mail Handlers, AFL-CIO in the mid-1960s. He was an active member of the York Bible Church, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion. He and Catherine had one child, Steward L. Brenneman Jr.

Brother Brenneman became one of us with his initiation into Mt. Zion Lodge #74, York, in August, 1998 where he became a Past Grand and received his Grand Lodge Degree in 2001. He was Secretary of Mt. Zion Lodge #74 for several years. He immediately became active in the Grand Lodge serving as Grand Guardian for Grand Master Joseph M. Strausser from 2002-2003. After that, he served as District Deputy Grand Master from 2003-2006 and Grand Master from 2007-2008. He was also elected as Alternate Sovereign Grand Representative for several years, a position which he held at the time of his death, along with being a Representative to the Middletown Home as a Director. He held active roles in Salome Rebekah Lodge #30 of York, where he was initiated a Rebekah in 2002. He received his Rebekah Assembly Degree in 2008. He was also a Patriarch of Mount Vernon Encampment #14 of York where he joined in 1999 and, after serving as Chief Patriarch, held the position of Scribe for several years. Patriarch Brenneman served under Grand Patriarch William S. Mooney as his Grand Outside Sentinel from 2009-2010. He also held an Associate Membership in Triune Lodge #307. He served on many committees in all branches of the Order and still did so at the time of

In July of 2000 he became a Chevalier of Canton Philadelphia #1 and then transferred membership as a charter member of Canton York #14 when

they were reinstituted. He became a Past Commandant and held the office of Clerk for several years. He later rose to the rank of Colonel when he was installed as the twentieth Department Commander of the Patriarchs Militant of Pennsylvania in June of 2010. Note that by the time that Colonel Brenneman became Department Commander our department had dropped to less than 8 Cantons, thus the lowering of rank for a Department Commander from Brigadier General to Colonel. Sadly, Colonel Brenneman passed away in July of 2011 at the age of 77 while faithfully serving the Chevaliers of Pennsylvania as Department Commander of Pennsylvania, Patriarchs Militant, I.O.O.F.

Unfortunately, the threat of poor weather kept attendance to this visit low. I was pleased to be joined by Department Chaplain Major Ellen Graham who delivered a prayer taken from the Department of Pennsylvania Memorial Service. She also furnished a Three Links flag holder donated by Mt. Zion Lodge to mark Colonel Brenneman's grave.





Noble Grand at Mt. Zion Lodge #74, both of which were where Colonel Brenneman at one time presided. We took time during the ceremony to reflect on how "Brother Stew" was a big part of very successful charitable programs at Mt. Zion. The Lodge sponsored a mini-Grand Prix race car for a number of years, an activity which focused on engaging young people and raising money for the Arthritis Foundation. Brother Bob Raffensberger, an associate member of my home Lodge, Victory #658, and an old friend of Stew Brenneman, still talks about this successful program and has shown me pictures of the race cars and the events. I found a good article in the June 21, 2004 York Dispatch on the mini-Grand Prix and all of the successful charitable work that Mt. Zion Lodge was doing under the direction of Brother Brenneman. He really did do a good job in carrying out the charitable ideals of Odd Fellowship. This inclination toward creative and generous charitable endeavors may well be the most enduring legacy of Past Department Commander Brenneman. In fact, Department Chaplain Major Graham, as current Noble Grand of Brother Brenneman's former Lodge, Mt. Zion #74, expressed renewed inspiration to continue with her charitable efforts at Mt. Zion as a result of our discussion of Colonel Brenneman's success as a Jurisdictional leader in Odd Fellows charitable work.

Colonel Brenneman's wife, Catherine A. (Naylor) Brenneman followed her beloved husband into the glorious presence of our Lord and Savior in 2019 at the age of 83. At this cemetery visitation Department Chaplain Graham and I prayed that Colonel and Mrs. Brenneman may continue to rest in eternal peace, and that past Department Commander Colonel Stewart LeRoy Brenneman knows that we remember and respect his time as our leader. His name does live on, spoken by his many friends in our Order, as if he were still with us today.
