Charles H. Bailey,

Brother Charles H. Bailey, 61, of Tamaqua, PA, was initiated an Odd Fellow on December 20, 1983 where he became a Past Grand on October 28, 1988 and received his Grand Lodge Degree on June 19, 1989. He then became active with the Grand Lodge, serving as Grand Guardian to PGM Clyde Barger from 1991-1992. He then went on to lead the Jurisdiction as our Grand Master from 1996-1997 as the youngest Grand Master at 32 years old. At his session, all living Past Grand Masters except for one was in attendance. On December 11, 1999, he transferred membership to become the Charter Noble Grand to Harmony Lodge No. 86, Tamaqua. He served then several years as Secretary and served as Secretary to the Odd Fellows Cemetery Inc., of Tamagua for over 30 years, as well as many years as caretaker. He served as District Deputy Grand Master from 1990 - 1994 and 1999 - 2000. After that, he served as District Deputy Grand Marshal. He served as Grand Secretary from 2000 - 2002 and 2012 - 2014. When he was not Grand Secretary, he worked in the Grand Lodge office several years under PGS William L. Locke. He was degree master of several degree teams, primarily the Harmony Lodge Degree team, notably as Noble Grand and venerable warden.

many years as Representative to Grand Lodge and Grand Encampment. He served as installing officer for Grand Lodge several times, notably for his son, Justin, when he was de-throned as youngest Grand Master, and assisted many Grand Masters through Unified Sessions. He was the third oldest tenured living PGM. He was a Turtle from the Finleyville Pond and helped bring the Degree of Siam back to Tamaqua. A title close to his heart, he was the Vice President of the Committee on Moral Decay.

He was an associate member of Mineral Lodge #285 in Saint Clair, for over 30 years. He was a former associate member of Walker Lodge #306, Philadelphia, from 1994 – 2015, serving and traveling with their degree team. He knew all his degree parts by memory, and though he wasn't in some of the branches in decades, he remembered all of his charges.

He also held former membership in all the other branches. He joined Constance Rebekah Lodge #161, New Ringgold, on November 15, 1986. He transferred to Hester Rebekah Lodge #29, Tamaqua, then to Lady Sellers Rebekah Lodge #558 and finally became a charter member of Lady Harmony Rebekah Lodge #86, of Tamaqua, when they instituted June 12, 2010.

He was a former Patriarch of Scott Encampment No. 132, serving as District Deputy Grand Patriarch from 1989 - 1995 and serving as Grand Marshal for PGP Howard Chew from 1993 - 1994. He was active on the Royal Purple Degree Team.

He was a LT® of Canton Leesport No. 2, and placed the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns. He received several Medallion Awards and was given the Merit Award from Harmony Lodge. In 1992, he was awarded the Decoration of Chivalry. He was a member of the DDGM Association and served as 2VP to

the Odd Fellows Home of PA, as well as serving several years on the jurisdictional planning board. He was the main proponent to the Knoebel's Fun Daw.

Brother Charlie was a member of Christ Church in McKeansburg.

Born in Pottsville, PA, to Lloyd and Reta (Smith) Bailey, he was one of three brothers. Surviving is his wife of 42 years, Laura, PDDP of Lady Harmony Rebekah Lodge, one son, GS Justin and his wife Kate, one daughter, Ashley, wife of Stephen Pliska, six grandchildren, and one brother.

Odd Fellow services were conducted by Harmony Lodge.

As we close Charlie's Odd Fellow life, we go back to his installation night. "My main goal will be to improve our buildings and meetings. I ask all of you to think about how you are conducting meetings and ask yourself, "Is my lodge worthwhile to bring members into?" if they are, then you should have no problem with membership. We are competing with so much these days, and if you are going to ask someone to join a group that sits around a circle, pays a couple bills and has a few snacks, that person will much rather spend the night home with his family. So therefore, you see, if we conduct ourselves according to our laws, usages and principles, membership truly will take care of itself. Once we get up to snuff, we must then sell our treasured product. This organization prospered when the government didn't have education loans, when there weren't' insurance companies and when the only homes for the aged or orphans were terrible asylums. Today with the cutbacks we are again facing, less government for the youth, major cutbacks in the county and state homes, the ever rising costs of medical expenses and burying the dead. I truly believe our products are once again needed, but it is up to us to make the public aware.

From the October 1925 Pennsylvania Odd Fellow:

Each month, I have tried putting something from 100 years ago for you to deeply consider as WE are acting as Odd Fellows. This month, I have decided to put something else in; something else that was active 100 years ago, and it's pretty fascinating. At this time, we have Odd Fellow Lodges (meeting weekly), Rebekahs, Encampments, Cantons and Auxiliaries. We also have the various Past Grand and three link clubs, degree teams, county associations, picnic associations, committees. Odd Fellows and Rebekahs were busy seven days a week! Here's another thing I really didn't consider we had, but go to Walker Lodge, and look in their social hall behind their hockey table – the baseball trophies.

"The baseball season for the league of Philadelphia Lodges closed on September 26th, with Orphans' Rest Lodge, No. 132, of Darby, finishing first place, not having lost a game during the season. Elm Tree Lodge, No. 297, of Philadelphia, finished second with a loss of two games. The championship cup, together with a silver-mounted gavel presented by the Grand Master, are the trophies contested for this year, and will probably be presented during this month. Interest in lodge teams is hard to keep up, as many players worth while play with independent clubs. Next year there will probably be fewer clubs, and a greater activity is hoped for. Bowling teams are now being formed and a schedule lasting all winter is being arranged. Young men of the Lodges today demand something besides the routine business and degrees of the lodge, and the athletic committees are a valuable asset. Get your young men interested and hold them as valuable members."

HARMONY LODGE #86







THE TREASURER'S TALES - SEPTEMBER 2025

September sees the end of summer and beginning of fall. In September 1930 it was a warm month with a few days still hitting 80. The biggest event in the early twentieth century was in October 1929. The market crash is starting to affect many people and industries. The Great Depression is starting to be felt everywhere. Lodge dues collection is down fewer people go out. Once you pay your dues, lodge is still free. You can go to lodge and play cards and shoot pool without paying anything,

Many things happen all over the world, every day. Turning our attention to September 1930, we find that it was no exception. On September 6, the Brooklyn Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Phillies 22-8, a real pitching duel. On September 8, we see the first appearance of comic strig Blondie". On September 16, cross-state rivals have a slug-fest, with the Phillies trailing 10-5, they score 5 in 9th, then Pirates score 4 in top of 10th, so Phillies score 5 in bottom of 10th to win 15-14. On September 18, NY Yankee future Baseball Hall of Fame pitcher Red Ruffing hit 2 home runs to beat St Louis Browns, 7-6 at Sportsman's Park, St. Louis. On the same day, Philadelphia A's win AL championship for 2nd year in a row. On September 27, Chicago Cub's Hack Wilson's 2 home runs give him the NL record 56 home runs in a season. On September 28, Lou Gehrig's errorless streak ends at 885 consecutive games.

1930 was a popular year to be born, on the 16th Anne Francis, American actress (Honey West, Forbidden Planet, Pancho Villa), was born in Ossining, New York (d. 2011). On September 19, Bob Turley, American baseball pitcher (World Series 1956, 58 [MVP] New York Yankees; 3 times MLB All-Star; Cy Young Award 1958), was born in Troy, Illinois. On September 23, Ray Charles, American singer and pianist who pioneered soul music ("Georgia On My Mind"; "Mess Around"; "Hit The Road, Jack"), was born in Albany, Georgia.

The school year began on Wednesday, September 10, 1930 in Grovers Mill. The warm weather and recent, summer vacation had the students overactive as the school year began. The average school year in the United States was 153 days, compared to the 180-day school year we have now. Grovers Mill had a 165-day year and was considered progressive. The students did not think the longer year was progressive, they thought it was oppressive.

Barney had to get the students reading and writing, the basic tools in the English curriculum. Last year he asked the students to tell him what they expected to get from 10th grade English. He was not surprised when most of them answered "a passing grade" without explaining what material that entailed. Having become an experienced teacher, he didn't ask the same question. He ordered a supply of four recent novels, The Grapes of Wrath, Gone with the Wind, The Maltese Falcon and The Hobbit. He assigned one fourth of the class to each book. This was a semester project and we may hear the results of it in December.

Barney was the sponsor of the school newspaper in 1930-31. He had a group of over a dozen students who wanted to be on the newspaper staff. He assigned each student a topic and asked them to bring in an article of one typewritten page for him to review. Some topics were given to more than one student. The topics were celebrating Labor Day, the county fair, the autumnal equinox, the stock market, motion pictures, comic books, and new cars for 1931.

On the first Monday after Labor Day, the students met after class. Barney was overwhelmed by the responses. Celebrating Labor Day had several students assigned to it. He thought perhaps one of them would write about the social and economic contributions of American Workers and how labor had driven industry to new heights. No!! One of the students wrote about parades. She was in the band and her story detailed all the instruments, the songs, the beat of the drums and

other marching units. She detailed the fact that she disliked following a mounted horse unit. The other student who was assigned to Labor Day was a slightly overweight boy. He wrote about picnics. He was particularly proud that he was the winner of a hot dog eating contest.

The county fair was a little better. Barney expected the students to write about the animals and farm product displays. He assigned this topic to three students. Two of them were true to Barney's anticipation. The wrote about the cattle judging, the vegetable anomalies (a four pound potato), large chickens and turkeys and other farm related events. They were better writes than the Labor Day students. The third student wrote about the midway, the food concessions, rides and peep shows. The peep shows got a bit out of hand, but Barney was introduced to ribbon fries. If you have never eaten ribbon fries, go to a fair and try them. They are a cross between a potato chip and a French fry, bon apetit.

One science oriented student was assigned the autumnal equinox. He did a great job explaining the reasons for equal periods of day and night.

The stock market was a disaster. Two students were given this topic and they copied each other's work. Worse, they copied one on the students who wrote about the county fair. The stock market was all about the livestock auction. Barney had purchased a calf at the auction. He was there. He knew what happened. These students weren't there and didn't know how auctions worked. If they didn't do better for the next paper in two weeks, they were going to be dropped from the staff.

One girl was assigned to motion pictures. She looked at every fan magazine on the news stands. Although she was more interested in Emil Jannings than the movies themselves, she did a credible job. She reviewed *The Blue Angel* and several other current shows. Barney might let her do a column.

Several students were assigned to comic books. As you might guess, they liked comic books better than *The Grapes of Wrath*. The Shadow was a comic book hero of the era and everyone wrote about him. He used the name Lamont Cranston. There was a movie in 1994 and you can get more on the Shadow movie, here: https://www.imdb.com/title/tt0111143/.

New cars of 1931 came out in fall 1930. Every boy wanted to write about the new cars. He had two boys who went to every dealership in northern New Jersey. He had stories about Fords and Chevrolets, but 1930 had a lot of car brands. The Ford Model A was the best seller, followed by Plymouth and Chevrolet. The 1930 Buick Series 40 Phaeton turned heads (a phaeton is a 4-door convertible). Duesenberg was producing its J-series. Pierce Arrow and Morgan were other brands. Barney got his newspaper going and enjoyed being the sponsor. He would do this for several years until his farm took too much time. I know I have been wordy, but I hope you find this column enjoyable.

GL COMMITTEE EDUCATION & INSTRUCTION

Greetings to all Odd Fellows:

We the GL Committee on Education & Instruction wanted to decide how to be able to educate the entire organization and feel the best way is to have it published in the PA Odd Fellow and Rebekah Magazine. Hopefully, we will have to opportunity to place one in each month if possible. We urge you to take into consideration what is stated and try to learn something!

We figured the best thing to do is start simple – we are now in the month of September. For those who have been active in the Odd Fellows know the term of the Lodges run from October through September (GL Code – Article IV, Section 1). It has been like this for eons. For some reason, the past several years, this has been confusing Lodges, secretaries, Noble Grands, and even District Deputy Grand Masters. Lodges MUST be installed in October (GL Code – Paragraph 21 a). This is not new; by now, every Lodge should have had a personal visit by their DDGM. If your Lodge did not, contact the Grand Lodge immediately.

Elections are held the last meeting in September; nominations are held the meeting prior. For 98% of the Lodges, who meet twice a month, this means your first meeting in September, under new business, your Noble Grand will open up nominations of officers for Noble Grand, Vice Grand, Secretary (Recording & Financial if applicable), Treasurer, Grand Lodge and Alternate Grand Lodge reps, Trustee, Home Reps, and others as your specific by-laws my require. All offices must be gone through! The Noble Grand will then declare nominations closed until the next meeting.

At the last meeting in September, under unfinished business, Noble Grand will again re-open nominations and ask if there are any other nominations. If there are none, they are again closed. Under new business, your election will then be held. Many Lodges don't have contention, and can just have a motion passed

that since there is one nominee for each office, that the secretary cast a single ballot and the officers are nominated by acclimation. If you need to hold an election, refer to GL Code – Article IV, Section 2, how to properly hold an election.

Finally, this is the most important part – Odd Fellows CANNOT be elected or appointed to ANY office until they have the Third Degree. If they just have the initiatory, or first or second, they can temporarily fill an office for the evening, but they cannot be elected, nor appointed to an office. In order to be nominated as Vice Grand, the member must have served TWO TERMS as an appointed officer (GL Code – Article IV, Section 6. b.) In order to be nominated as Noble Grand, the member must be a Past Vice Grand, meaning they must have served as Vice Grand at least thirteen meetings in the preceding term (GL Code – Article IV, Section 6. a.). We are glad there are new, excited members joining; that doesn't mean you need to immediately make them leader. They need to learn the laws first. This has been a severe detriment to our Order recently. DDGM's make sure the people you're installing are legally allowed to be installed in to that office!!!

During September, make sure you contact your DDGM, if they have not contacted you, and make sure they have a date set for installation in October. If you want it done as a joint installation, or done during a different night and time, you need to request a dispensation. FINALLY – make sure your annual report is done prior to installation. Your DDGM cannot install you if your report is not complete and dues are not paid.

We hope this helps! Please take the time to work with this.

FROM THE DEPARTMENT COMMANDER...

HONORING MAJOR GENERAL EARL R. LEIBY, PDC

A large group joined me under scorching July skies at the beautiful and sacred grounds of Pleasant View Cemetery in Sinking Spring to honor and remember our sixteenth Department Commander, Major General Earl R. Leiby, who lead the Pennsylvania Patriarchs Militant from 1986 to 1988.



Earl Rudolph Leiby was born in Harrisburg in 1905, the son of John and Helen Leiby. Earl worked as an electrician for 32 years at Atlantic Pipeline Company until retiring in 1967. He lived in Sinking Spring for much of his life and contributed greatly to his community. With what seems like limitless energy, considering his career, raising a family and being the consummate Odd Fellow, Mr. Leiby was also an active member of the NRA, local rod and gun clubs and numerous other community and service groups.

Brother Leiby became one of us in 1926. He was a member of Wernersville Lodge #835,

Sinking Spring Lodge #660 and Leesport Lodge #141. He was an active member of Hamburg Encampment #106 and Conrad Weiser Encampment #214. Hamburg Encampment moved to Leesport in 1996, and upon doing so was renamed the Earl R. Leiby Encampment #106. He was elected Grand Patriarch in 1963-64 and then became Grand Representative from the Grand Encampment to the Sovereign Grand Lodge for more than 20 years. He was a member of Patriarchs Militant Canton Reading #2 in Hamburg (now Canton Leesport #2). After rising through the ranks of the Department Council and taking on the difficult task of Department Director of Works, Chevalier Leiby was elected in 1986 to be our sixteenth Department Commander, with the rank of Major General, serving from 1986-88. Major General Leiby was awarded our highest honor, the Grand Decoration of Chivalry. This honor entitled him to be officially known as Major General Sir Earl Rudolph Leiby, GDC.

Major General Leiby also served as President of the Jurisdictional Planning Board in the 1960s and Chairman of the Mid-Atlantic States Conclave during the 1970's. As DDGM he was an active and proficient leader of installation teams and was an outstanding Degree Master for the Third Degree. Countless other committees and initiatives were given his full attention over his many years as an Odd Fellow. For example, Brother Leiby undertook the formation of a tri-county Odd Fellows organization for Schuylkill, Berks and Lebanon counties. Called the Blue Mountain Odd Fellowship Association, it was formed in the 1950's and included all branches of Odd Fellowship. The purpose was to strengthen weaker Lodges and perform degree work. They also provided pocket prayer books to Odd Fellows serving in the Armed Forces. Projects like this helped preserve the Order which we are so fortunate to be part of today.

We also took time to remember Mrs. Emily Leiby, for she dedicated many years to the good works of the Rebekahs. She served as Noble Grand of Lady Colfax Rebekah Lodge #182 where Earl was also a member. Sister Emily died 1986. She and Earl shared 52 years of marriage together. We respect the many years of her life that she dedicated to our Order and the faithful assistance that she gave to Major General Leiby in the carrying out of his duties.

Major General Earl R. Leiby died in 1995 at the age of 89, following his beloved wife Emily into the glorious presence of Our Lord. They were a true Odd Fellows couple, dedicated fully to our Order. We observed our sacred symbolism



permanently cast in bronze upon their marker, both the Three Links and the Rebekah Dove, showing their eternal commitment to our principles. After his death, Major General Leiby's grieving fraternal family expressed their respect and gratitude by naming his former Encampment the Earl R. Leiby Encampment #106 and designating our Jurisdictional Canton as the Earl R. Leiby Canton #1, thus ensuring that his name will forever be spoken by the Brothers and Sisters of Pennsylvania Odd Fellowship.

I was deeply honored on this day to be joined by three generations of the Leiby family. Son Don and his lovely wife Esther bravely endured the heat and humidity as we honored Don's parents. Their children, Mark and Adonna (with husband Steven) attended as well. Adonna's children Parker and Sedona (Earl Leiby's great Grandchildren) were also there. They were impressed with the achievements of their Great Grandfather and learned about our ancient Fraternal Order that still reveres his name. We in turn were privileged to hear the family's stories about Earl's love of hunting, fishing and fluency in the Pennsylvania Dutch dialect.

The Earl R. Leiby Encampment #106 was represented by Grand Treasurer of the Grand Encampment Jim Sellers and Dave Sellers. Patriarch Jim gave a moving prayer and Patriarch Dave assisted me in reverently placing Odd Fellows and Rebecca memorial flags. In attendance from Canton Leesport #2 were Capt. (R) Lesher and Lt.(R) Blatt. Lady Colfax Rebekah Lodge #182 was represented by Rebekah Assembly Past President Wert. Brother Walter Adams of Leesport Lodge also attended.

We congregated under the shade of a nearby pine tree for our service, agreeing that the Leibys would have wanted us to do so for our comfort while our large group of family, both fraternal and biological, gathered to pay our respects. As we moved into the hot sun for one final group picture in front of the Leiby gravesite we felt the spirit of Earl and Emily join with their extended family in Friendship, Love and Truth. May Past Department Commander Major General Earl and Mrs. Leiby forever rest in peace, knowing that we will always remember them.
